Note by the ISS/SIC President





Dear Members of ISS/SIC

I would like to report on what I have been doing for the past few months since being installed as the President of ISS in Aug 2022.

First of all, the plans for the ISW, 25th to 29th August 2024 in Kuala Lumpur, is proceeding well. I do hope to see many of you at the congress. Please do check the ISS/SIC website for updates on the programme. There are no more restrictions to travel in Malaysia since August last year. It is unlikely that another pandemic will strike again.

I would like to remind members again that the main goal of the ISS/SIC is for teaching and training of surgeons across the world, particularly in low and middle income countries (LMICs). However, there are many other surgical societies, such as the Royal Colleges of Surgeons

in UK and Ireland, American College of Surgeons (ACS) as well as the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS) that also have this goal. I attended the International Surgical Leaders Forum at the ACS Clinical Meeting in San Diego in Aug 2022, which was chaired by Dr Andrew Hill, Past President of ISS/SIC with Vice-President Dr Ari Leppäniemi. The agenda of the meeting was to discuss surgical training needs in Sub Saharan Africa, and the surgical leaders in these countries gave a presentation on what barriers they faced in surgical training in their countries. We also had a meeting with Dr Patricia Turner, the CEO of the ACS, and Dr Girma Tefera, Medical Director of the ACS Operation Giving Back, to discuss a collaborative project between ISS/SIC and ACS to map surgical training in LMICs.

As part of the ISS/SIC commitment to Global Surgery, ISS/SIC is also a member of the G4 Alliance, which is a coalition of over 70 surgical organisations worldwide with the mission to increase awareness, foster political will, shape policy and mobilise resources to make access to quality, safe, timely and affordable emergency and essential surgical, obstetric, trauma and anesthesia (SOTA) care a global health priority and a reality for all. The G4 Alliance held a Permanent Council meeting in Dublin in Nov 2022, which I attended. There are 2 working groups which I

feel are relevant to ISS/SIC. First is the International Standard and Guidelines for Quality Safe Surgery and Anesthesia chaired by Andrew Hill and Jaymie Henry. Some of you may have been present at the launch of the 11 Best Practice Recommendations at the ISW 2022 in Vienna. Currently this working group is carrying out a few pilot implementation projects in LMICs on some of these recommendations. We hope to hear the results in ISW 2024 in Kuala Lumpur. The other working group is the Operative Encounter Registry working group, chaired by Dr Neil Wetzig and Dr Chris Dodgion (both are ISS/SIC members). The data points for the registry have been developed, and this working group is working with the WHO to launch this registry internationally.

The future of ISS/SIC lies in the young future surgeons, and our mission is also to work with the medical surgical student societies IASSS (International Association of Student Surgical Societies) as well as the trainee surgeons, so that they will eventually become members of ISS/SIC, and take on leadership roles. It is important that these young future surgeons are given the opportunity to attend the ISW in Kuala Lumpur in 2024, and we are working with the ISS Foundation to provide travel grants for these young surgeons to attend the conference. We also have the newly formed Foundation for Global

Surgical Care, which has a similar mission of providing education for surgeons in all parts of the world.

As well as the integrated societies and the participating societies, we must also acknowledge the associated societies from different parts of the world, South Africa, South East Asia, North Africa, South Asia, South America, as well as the Royal College of Surgeons of England. These societies are given the opportunity to take part in the ISW, as well as to invite ISS/SIC surgeons to deliver lectures at their national conferences.

ISS/SIC also invites applications for fellowship of ISS (FISS) from members who have been full members of ISS/SIC for at least 5 years. The information is available at this website: http://iss-sic.com/membership/fellowship.html

Finally, I would like to thank our council members, which include the Presidents of the 6 Integrated Societies, for their support. We recently had an online council meeting in March 2023, and with council members from all over the world, I would especially like to thank our Australian members who were up at 2 am for the council meeting.

Report ISS Foundation

Dear members of the ISS/SIC

I happily submit this short report of the ISS Foundation which is now working closely with the European ISS/SIC Foundation hopefully to further our joint mission of educating surgeons from the developing world.

The Board of Directors of the ISSF has made some changes hopefully to induce more educational opportunities for surgeons of the developing world.

- 1. Dr Rob Parkyn has (unfortunately) retired and has been replaced by Dr Inne Borel Rinkes of the IAES who is intimately involved in overseeing and organizing the IAES in-country educational activities in the future. i.e. the INTEREST Programme.
- 2. Dr Julie Ann Sosa has stepped down, because she feels that her contribution to the board will not be productive; we are sorry to lose her.
- 3. I have approached BSI and our sister society has appointed Dr Ipshita Prakash to serve on the Board of Directors. We look forward to her insightful suggestions.

4. Similarly, IATSIC has appointed Dr Tarek Razek as their representative for the Board. Dr Razek will help to organize the IATSIC activities and has considerable experience in this field. Again we look very much forward to his thoughts and participation in continuing the outreach educational programmes of IATSIC

Other notable updates

The IAES has used very successfully the \$20,000 grant they were awarded from the ISSF in 2019 just before the COVID pandemic. There is a report of the very productive use of these funds (anyone interested please ask me) and fully supports the mission of the ISSF to help to educate surgeons in the developing world.

The membership of the ISS/SIC should remember that the ISSF contributed \$60,000 to support/offset the financial burden of ISS/SIC membership in the underdeveloped countries during the COVID years; thus there is active ongoing interest in helping to further medical education in the developing world

Plans for 2024

1. We are fully expecting to continue to offer the Travel scholars programme for the 2024 Kuala Lumpur meeting of the ISS/SIC. The ISSF is hopefully expecting the ISS/SIC to continue to support this programme with the usual financial input to the ISSF to finance this programme. Also, we hope that IATSIC, ASAP, and ISDS will also fund one or more travelers for the 2024 Kuala Lumpur meeting. Announcements of these travel grants and

how to apply and who is a candidate for these scholarships will go out this early fall. Remember the candidates must be <40 years old and have an active surgical and/or anesthesia career with some defined interest in education.

- 2. The ISSF is actively looking for opportunities to provide educational expertise for hands-on training programmes in the developing world and I encourage anyone with interest in organizing such a programme in their home country to contact me directly. To organize one of these programmes, it is the expectation that the home country will provide the site, needed surgical technology, and cover all the organization for attendees. The ISSF will review any such plans, and if possible, send the appropriate educators to the country where the programme is to be held. The ISSF will cover the costs of flying the educators to the country, but we expect that the home country will make it worthwhile and guarantee more than 20 participants.
- 3. The President of the ISSF (Dr John Hunter, our past president of the ISS/SIC) and the Secretary/Treasurer are discussing potential ways to raise more money for the ISSF, again to further our mission of educating surgeons in the developing world with in-country educational, handson seminars, training sessions, etc. This work will go hand in hand in with the European ISS Foundation.

Julie Ann Sosa, Editor in Chief WJS Hello and happy spring to members of the International Surgical Society and readers and authors of the World Journal of Surgery (WJS)! The WJS editorial leadership has been busy over the last year, managing 1,849 total submissions to the journal in 2022, of which 1,247 were original articles. We continue to be selective, with an overall acceptance rate of 22.7%. And

we are committed to providing efficient peer review to our authors; the average time to first decision at the journal is just 31 days. Thanks to the hard work of our editorial office and managing editor (Laura Shearer), our authors and their impactful science, we have seen our WJS article downloads accelerate in number: over the last two years, they have increased

by 11.6% per year, and we have doubled

the number of downloads over the last

seven years. In 2022 alone, there were

nearly 1.2 million WJS article downloads.

This is a telling measure of overall journal

impact. It is also important to note that

nearly 22% of our publications are Open

Access, which is significantly higher than most other mature journals (about 8-10%).

We have continued to increase and im-

prove our social media presence to pro-

mote the science (and the scientists!)

published in the WJS. Last year, we wel-

We are committed to bringing energy, passion, and creativity to the WJS, and we are excited to see new faces from around the world join our leadership team. This winter, we welcomed Dr Linwah Yip of Pittsburgh, PA, in the United States to serve as our associate editor for endocrine surgery, representing the International Association of Endocrine Surgeons; she replaces Dr Janice Pasieka of Canada. Welcome Dr Yip, and thank you for your service, Dr Pasieka! And Professor Dileep Lobo of Nottingham, England, has become our associate editor for hepatobiliary surgery, replacing Dr Michelle de Oliveira of Switzerland, Welcome Prof. Lobo and thank you, Dr de Oliveira!

To our editorial board, we are excited to welcome new members Dr Erin Andrade of the United States for critical care and trauma surgery; Mr Ethem Gecim of Turkey for colorectal and Gl surgery; Dr Kiyoshi Hasegawa of Japan for HPB and surgical oncology; Dr David Hughes of the United States for endocrine surgery; Dr Shirang Kulkarni of Italy for HPB, colorectal, esophagus, Gl and bariatric surgery; Dr Yoshihiro Nabeya of Japan for esophagus, stomach and Gl surgery; Prof. Edoardo Virgilio of Italy for HPB, colorectal, es-

ophagus, hernia and GI surgery; and Dr Thomas Weiser of the United States for critical care and trauma surgery. And we are thankful for the faithful service over the years of Prof Markus Buechler, Dr Miguel Herrera, Dr Martin Hubner, Dr Ava Kwong, Dr Rifat Latifi, Dr Barbra Miller, Prof John Reynolds, Dr Dasgupta Sanyandev, Prof Menno Vriens, Dr Heather Yeo, all of whom will be rotating off.

We happily satisfied criteria set by our publisher to allow the ISS/SIC to receive an incentive bonus and also promote many of the journalistic innovations we have developed over the last several years. In 2022, we published 11 We Asked the Experts manuscripts, 60 invited commentaries and editorials, and eight inspirational Women/leaders in Surgery biographies, as well as two sets of Enhanced Recovery After Surgery (ERAS) guidelines and 10 symposia articles. We remain committed to promoting diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI), and our DEI ombuds' review of all accepted submissions led to 13 manuscripts being returned to authors so they could address opportunities for improvement in this dimension.

It is an honor to serve as Editor in Chief of the WJS; I am thankful for the privilege of serving the ISS, our authors and our readers from around the world!


The Congress receives major support from the Ministry of Health of Malaysia and the Malaysian Convention and Exhibition Bureau.

Report IAES

It is with pleasure that we present our report for recent activities in IAES following our successful Vienna 2022 meeting. Important developments in our Association include:

INTEREST PROGRAMME

The leadership for the INTEREST programme (International Endocrine Surgery Training) switched from Rob Parkyn to Inne Borel-Rinkes of the Netherlands.

Shortly after the IAES meeting in Vienna, the first Malawi Surgical Oncology Summer school was held in Blantyre, Malawi (22–26 August 2022). This summer school



was organized by Dutch and Malawian colleagues acting together in designing the programme and presenting topics either pre-recorded or live with robust discussions. Attendance was both on-site (>50 persons) and online and involved residents, specialists, nurses and tropical doctors. The programme spanned a wide range of surgical oncology topics, and included half a day on ENT and thyroid tumors, with lectures and case presentations by our IAES-colleague Prof Schelto Kruijff

from Groningen and Dr Wakisa from Malawi. It was agreed to continue this joint educational initiative and the 2023 edition is foreseen to be held in October.

Next, Inne Borel-Rinkes had the honor to co-organize, and present at, the first Surgical Symposium on Endocrine, Breast and Oncoplastic Surgery in Nairobi, Kenya, which was held at M.P. Shah Hospital on November 5, 2022 under the auspices of the Surgical Society of Kenya. The entire morning session was spent on thyroid, and parathyroid tumors as well as on pancreatic neuro-endocrine tumors. The programme had been designed jointly between Dutch and Kenyan colleagues and presentations were predominantly given by Kenyan specialists from various Nairobian and regional institutions, including the Academic Hospital of the Aga Khan University. Some 50 participants, including both medical specialists (mostly general and ENT-surgeons) and residents, attended the conference, while several more registered online to follow the presentations and participate in the discussions. Again, the activity was judged to be of high quality and will definitely be repeated in 2023.

The plans for 2023 are as follows:

- Malawi Summerschool on Surgical Oncology (October). The programme on endocrine tumors might be expanded to half a day
- Surgery Symposium Nairobi (November) if Endocrine Surgery is again chosen as a main topic
- Extended visit to the Endocrine unit of Bugando MC, Mwanza Tanzania. This visit is not only for talks and meetings but to also explore setting up an exchange programme for fellows/younger surgeon. Tips and tricks "on the job" may be included.
- Nepal: First National workshop on the Thyroid organized by the Nepalese Association of Thyroid, Laryngology & Allied Professionals. A three day programme has been proposed, covering a variety of endocrine surgery topics with emphasis on surgical technique. We propose the INTEREST team to consist of Prof Agarwal, a younger faculty member from Lucknow, and Inne Borel-Rinkes. The course is foreseen for March 31- April 2, 2023.
- Inne Borel-Rinkes has been invited to take part in a seminar for the surgical trainees in endocrine and breast sur-

gery in Malaysia, to be held in Sabah in May. A one day programme on Endocrine Surgery is anticipated.

ISW August 2024

The Scientific committee of IAES has set together a provisional programme for the KL meeting. The core of the meeting will as always consist of oral and poster abstracts from members selected from around the world. Two State of the Art Lectures will be held: "Anaesthetic alternatives for neck surgery" by Hisham Abdullah, Malaysia, and "Endocrine surgery in the elderly" by Martha Zeiger, USA. The Presidential address is titled "The Nobel prize and its surgeons" and lecturer is Jan Zedenius. The Peter Heimann Lecture will be "Endocrine pathology for surgeons" by Christofer Juhlin, Sweden.

In addition, we will have an "Interesting case session", and a Basic Science session. Three symposia will be held: "Surgical leadership", "Targeted therapies for thyroid cancer", and "Update on adjunct technologies in thyroid and parathyroid surgery". A novelty for us will be the combined session with ISDS on "Mouth to Anus Neuroendocrine Tumours". We do believe all these interesting subjects will attract many attendees!

We look very much forward to the meeting 2024, and we will work hard together with the local arrangements committee under the leadership of Dr Imi Sairi Ab Hadi to fulfil the high expectations we know that our members will have on this event.

Time has been set aside for our International members to experience the sights, sounds and tastes of wonderful Malaysia and we look forward to welcoming all our local and international friends.

Report on the activities of IATSIC November 2022 – April 2023

I would like to extend a warm greeting to all IATSIC members around the world. Much of the educational activity of IAT-SIC continues and in this short newsletter update, your executive committee would like to update you on current activities of the organisation.

DSTC and **DATC** training course activities

- Course numbers and activity have rebounded and we are nearly back at pre-COVID levels. Face-to-face course activity has happily returned along with the attendance of international faculty to all courses.
- Dr Tarek Razek is continuing to liaise
 with course and programme directors
 to assist in their return to normal operations. We are very grateful to the hard
 work of the DSTC programmes around
 the world in their efforts to get courses going again, and in many cases,
 for continuing to hold courses during
 some very trying times.

NTMC (National Trauma Management Course)

- This flagship IATSIC course was developed years ago to address the need for a large capacity advanced trauma care course without expensive overhead costs. It has been especially successful in India and Sri Lanka to date.
- Under the leadership of Dr Ranjith Ellawala and Dr Tim Hardcastle, IATSIC is looking at updating some of the teaching materials and also at collaborative efforts with other similar international courses to ensure longevity and that

the needs of those utilising this course are heard and met.

Webinars

- Our ongoing series of informative webinars continues with international collaboration from our partner societies around the world. These webinars are second monthly with the next one planned for June 6th 2023 in conjunction with the Australia and New Zealand Association for the Surgery of Trauma (ANZAST). - We are delighted with how popular this series has been and look forward to future collaborative efforts.

Global commitments

WHO Collaboration

The ongoing IATSIC-WHO collaboration and planned advanced operative trauma management course continues to power forward. Dr Tina Gaarder is the IATSIC lead in this effort in liaison with the WHO and the assistance of Dr Tim Hardcastle.

- The educational content provided by IATSIC members is complete. This will now be adapted into course design templates which will take some effort. The timing of course pilots is being determined and will be confirmed by the time of our next newsletter later this year.
- A recent bulletin of the World Health
 Organisation was published highlighting a new mandate of the WHO Assembly nations toward better coordinated emergency, critical and operative
 care services as an integral part of
 comprehensive primary care (https://
 www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/
 PMC10042088/?report=classic). This
 important step highlights the need for
 coordinated care of injured trauma patients and their needs and imbeds this
 need at the most fundamental levels of
 system planning.

Report IASMEN



ISS FOUNDATION BOARD



Alliance for Surgery and Anesthesia Presence (ASAP) Report 17th March 2023

ASAP is the ISS/SIC's youngest integrated society, and also the only international organisation that specifically represents Global Surgery throughout the life-course, spanning students, trainees, consultants, and emeritus professors.

The Global Surgery Landscape

While the global need for access to safe affordable surgical care when needed continues to be pressing, the global surgery landscape has changed through the pandemic. The fragility of health systems, including hospital care, in many countries has been exposed by overwhelming clinical demand, inadequate supply chains, lack of preparation, ineffective leadership, and loss of workforce. Surgical care has been directly and indirectly affected, and the harmful consequences are well under-



stood. In a significant development that signals integration of surgical care into the global public health arena more than ever before, The World Health Assembly will in May 2023 consider a Resolution on Emergency, Critical and Operative (ECO) Care that identifies these interdependent and essential services as vital elements of all health systems. Passage of this resolution is a credit to all those who have worked on bringing attention to and advancing global surgery, and in which ASAP has played a significant role over the past decade

ISW 2022, Vienna

We congratulate the organisers of the ISW in Vienna on an outstanding meeting. The

ASAP programme was interesting and brought in a number of new presenters and participants from around the world, with stronger representation from Africa than in previous years. We particularly valued shared sessions with IATSIC, IASSS and AWS. Attendance was moderate and, as is so often the case, stronger earlier in the week. We noted this for future event programming.

ASAP Council & Executive

A quorum was not present at the Vienna meeting, so an informal meeting of ASAP members was held to discuss the future directions of ASAP, the recruitment of new executive members, and how to attract future members. The ASAP President met with the executive committees of IATSIC and IASSS to ensure continued crosslinks between societies. Agreement was made with the IATSIC Executive to seek collaboration opportunities and explore ways in which partnership between ASAP and IATSIC can be enhanced.

The ASAP Executive has been in a transitional phase since the Vienna meeting. President-elect Professor Milliard Derbew has assumed the presidency, which will be formally ratified in an ASAP Council meeting by mid-year as per the ASAP Constitution. He is supported by Past-President Russell Gruen, Secretary-Treasurer Liz Drum, and

Past-Past-President Kathleen Casey while new and additional Executive committee membership is finalised. It is with pleasure that we welcome Sav Verhage as the formal representative of IASSS to the ASAP Council.

Professor Derbew has brought a new set of leadership capabilities to ASAP and is ideally placed to guide its evolution. Professor Derbew is a medical educator, surgeon and global health leader, who has been dedicated to improving the capacity of medical and academic systems over decades. He has served as a medical doctor, hospital administrator and clinic owner, professor, dean, university vice president and researcher, and global health activist. In addition to his clinical surgery roles, he has been CEO of King Faisal Hospital Rwanda, founded the Department of Pediatric Surgery at Addis Ababa University in Ethiopia, was an Executive Board Member of Lifebox, and has been President of both COSEC-SA and the Surgical Society of Ethiopia. He has published over 70 peer reviewed scientific articles and is a distinguished member of several professional associations.

Membership & Financials

Membership of ASAP has been stable without increase for the past 4 years. A major role of the new executive will be to

increase membership, particular focus on young members – trainees and early consultants, working in association with IASSS and the other ISS/SIC integrated societies. It will be the task of the new executive to refine and redefine the value-proposition of membership of ASAP in a post-pandemic world in which the needs continue to be great but global surgery is recognised as a critical component of integrated emergency, critical and operative care systems.

Future Directions

Spawned through greater involvement of surgeons from the African continent, and the excellent work of IASSS and our ISS/SIC and other partners, we are pleased in the level of interest in engagement activities in potential hubs in Rwanda, Ethiopia and South Africa, for example. The ability for ASAP to host face-to-face events has been limited in recent years because of both the pandemic and the developing size of the membership, and these hubs offer the opportunity to grow activity and communities of practice.

Global engagement will continue to be fostered, especially as we work towards the Kuala Lumpur ISW.

Mentorship Programme with IASSS

ASAP and IASSS, within the ISS/SIC family, represent Global Surgery throughout the life-course, spanning students, trainees, consultants, and emeritus professors. As such ASAP and IASSS have a unique career development opportunity for those interested in global surgery, and in doing so strengthening the future workforce and preparing future leaders. ASAP has valued the opportunity to support IASSS in the development of a mentoring network connecting members across time zones and generations, to share experiences and provide inspiration, guidance and support. Working with the IASSS and the ISS/SIC in its entirety, trainees' groups, National Chapters, and academic and professional organisations, we look forward to the launch of a mentoring network.

Report IASSS

The main focus of 2022 of the IASSS was the Future Surgeons Programme (FSP) and International Surgical Week (ISW). The team also managed to reach a few admirable goals.

- 1) Executive Committee Achievements
- A Middle East Chapter was established with the first ever Chapter Lead for region was incorporated into the Capacity Team.
- The Senior Consultants portfolio was established with the aim of providing mentorship to the academy portfolio and to assist with the expansion of the society by creating opportunities for postgraduate members.
- A newly added Telegram social participating application group was created for IASSS members
- The Editorial team hosted a series explaining the FSP programme and was later followed-up by short introductory videos from the selected FSP delegates.
- 2) The Hofburg in Vienna, Austria, was the venue for the ISW conference during 15-18 August 2022, during which the IASSS hosted two sessions. Jessica Davies delivered an oral presentation presented on the research findings from "Effects of the Coronavirus Pandemic on Medical and Surgical Education: Results of an International Survey by the IASSS" on behalf of the IASSS. 3) The 2022 FSP included 11 student/junior-doctor delegates from across four continents. Delegates were closely involved with the day-to-day activities and support of the conference including welcoming speakers, ensuring the presentations were uploaded onto the computers before the session started, bringing the presentation to the screen, collecting and displaying name cards for speakers, bringing refreshments for speakers, taking photos for speakers after the session, etc.

4) Post-ISW Achievements

- The Associates role was established to allow an IASSS member to be associated on the executive committee of an ISS Integrated Society. The aim of these roles is to facilitate closer connections between the IASSS and the six Integrated Societies, to initiate collaborative projects, and to assist those with social media presence. After the ISW, an Associate position was secured among the executive committees of IATSIC, ISDS and ASAP.
